1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

The college has a formal mechanism to obtain feedback on curriculum from stakeholders, students, teachers, employers, alumni and parents, coordinated by the IQAC. Feedback is analysed and reports are submitted to the Principal for further action. ? The various departments take feedback from their students on restructuring and design of curriculum. ? Feedback on curriculum enrichment and restructuring was sought from industry experts, employers, and alumnae working in the education and industry sectors soon after the award of autonomy. ? Boards of Studies of the departments comprise experts in the respective fields. ? During the PTWA meetings (General Body and Executive) suggestions were given about the need for inculcation of certain skills. ? Many of the departments invite suggestions from eminent experts in national and international institutions of repute. ? Suggestions are invited from resource persons who visit the campus ? Faculty who attend seminars, workshops, forum discussions, webinars also obtain significant feedback which they contribute to their departmental curricular restructuring. Regarding the UG PG syllabus, the students feedback is as follows: Nearly 53.7 suggested that even though the ongoing syllabus in the college is good, some changes have to be made by incorporating latest trends and deleting unimportant and outdated topics from the syllabus. Among the 472 respondents, 296 respondents argued that there are some papers which they wish to be changed. All the faculty remarked that the ongoing syllabus is standard, but same changes have to be made by including latest topics and socially relevant concepts. Among the 100 respondents, 99 respondents argued that there are some papers which have to be changed according to current scenario requirements. Faculty remarked that employability oriented courses should have first preference in the syllabus. Nearly 98 of parents are satisfied with the syllabus which their daughters are following in this institution. Only 2.39 parents argued they need some improvements in the syllabus by more job oriented and skill oriented courses. 66 out of 152 of the Alumnae respondents were satisfied with their curriculum and courses they studied in this institution. Nearly 43.69 of Alumni demanded that they prefer the introduction of new paper or new module in the syllabus their requirements include the introduction of Development Biology, Ecology, immunology, journalism, computer courses , Banking paper, Tally module, Research methodology chapter in Ph.D. programmes. 130 out of 152 Alumni respondents responded that they wish they had acquired some extra skill oriented courses in this college. Nearly 62 of employers were satisfied with their employee. 90 of employers opined the need for upgraded IT skills. 52.5 of employers focused on the necessity for team skills and 47.5 stressed on communication skills. Action Taken The suggestion and recommendations were seriously considered by the

institution when the university stipulated 20 changes were made in the syllabi from 201819 onwards. Skill acquisition modules, recent trends, socially relevant concepts, employability oriented modules and capability enhancement modules were incorporated into the existing and newly introduced syllabi.

The college has always maintained a culture that fosters decentralization and participative management. Two such practices that were followed in the academic year 201819 are 1) Curricular Restructuring through Decentralization and Participation 2) Decentralized and Participative Allocation of funds for Academic Non Academic Purpose. I) Curricular Restructuring The award of autonomy has given us considerable freedom to frame curricula and syllabi within the stipulations of the university and state government. As the first step towards restructuring of curricula and syllabi, the departments were given directions to initiate the process by holding discussions with their students to find their suggestions. The faculty of the departments also forwarded their suggestions for change. Feedback was also collected from the stakeholders including the Alumnae, the Employers and the Parents. Inputs from subject experts were also sought. Consolidation of the collected feedback inputs from the stakeholders and experts was done, and the report was placed in the 'Boards of Studies'. Changes and suggestions made by the BOS were incorporated and the approved curricula Syllabi were then presented and ratified by the Academic Council. II) Allocation of funds The institution maintains complete transparency in its financial functions due to the participative and decentralized allocation of funds for various purposes. The financial requirements of the departments and associations for the academic year on the basis of necessary needs are collected prior to the institutional annual budget preparation. This is prepared by the departments Associations was consultation with the students. The consolidated budget is submitted to the Board of Management for approval. Departments are encouraged to apply to various funding agencies for their proposals. In certain cases, some of the necessary expenses for unfunded projects and proposals are taken care of by the management. Finance committee oversees and monitors the funds including those received from sources like the UGC, DST, DBT or any other government or nongovernment agency. Budget is prepared annually on the basic of allocated funds, and funds are

distributed on a need - based manner to all departments and associations. The purchase committee overseas the purchase of equipments and necessary commodities. 7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

General waste Management • Students are conscientised on the necessity of effective waste management through invited talks, interactions with class teachers and tutors, and by the efforts of the Discipline Committee, NSS, Nature Club, Biodiversity club and the College Union leaders. • The entire campus is divided into Zones and each Zone is entrusted to a department for cleaning and greening. • Priority is given to the use of organic manure in the campus. • Display boards are set up on environmental awareness and waste reduction • Vermi- composting practices • Distribution of Paper Bags • Mushroom cultivation from waste Solid waste management • Use of plastic bags, cups and plates are highly restricted • The college has proper communication with the local body for regular collection of solid waste from the campus. • Biogas plant • Sorting and disposal of biodegenerable and non - degenerable wastes separately • Flex made of plastic is banned in the campus. Liquid waste management • Special drainages are provided to dispose of chemical waste from the laboratories. Ewaste management • Ewaste is disposed through external agencies. Rain water harvesting • Water auditing is conducted for the evaluation of facilities of raw water intake and determining the facilities for water treatment and reuse. • To minimize water shortage, an elaborate rain water harvesting system has been set up. The water thus collected and conserved is put to maximum use and utilized for daily routine purpose (except for

drinking). • The rain water harvested (as per the external audit report) is 20000 L/ Season. This has since been enhanced. • Water treatment system is to be installed in the proposed new canteen (Construction ongoing) as well as in the chemical laboratories, which will help recycle the water lost through outlets to be used for gardening and toilet purposes. • Awareness programs on the management of sustainable water use are being conducted. Green Practices • The college campus is bird friendly and stands unique with its lush green expanse, paved pathways, colourful plants, tall trees, in a serene, soothing environment. • The college has a history of planting 2500 saplings on the Munackal beach, in collaboration with the Dept. of Forests, in the year 2005. • Trees are planted by students along roadsides, and on both sides of the road, in front of the College. • Active participation in 'Save Energy Campaign' and 'Haritha Keralam' Project of the Kerala Government • World Environmental Day, World Forest Day, Ozone Day, Wetland Day and Clean - up Days celebrated without fail • As per the audit report, the tree cover of the campus is 15028 m2, with 193 plant species identified, vegetable garden area of 150 m2 and a medical plant garden in 8 cents.
