



1.1. History of the College

St. Joseph's College, Irinjalakuda is a college for women, affiliated to the University of Calicut and managed by St. Joseph Educational Society of Pavanathma province of the Congregation of the Holy Family. The Congregation was founded in 1914 by the visionary zeal of Blessed Mariam Thresia, a pioneer in the field of family apostolate, beatified on 9th April 2000. The founding of the college in 1964 under the able leadership of late Mother Josephine, the Superior General, was a memorable event in the history of the Congregation. The College, which is an answer to the ever increasing demand for higher education among young ladies, was reaccredited in the third cycle at A level in 2013 by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) - an autonomous institution under the U.G.C. The college was awarded Autonomy in March 2016. The college was granted the status of College with Potential for Excellence by UGC in April 2016. The college is among the top 150 colleges in the NIRF(National Institute Ranking Framework, wing of MHRD, Govt. of India) rating in 2021.

1.2 The Vision

Women empowered and liberated through knowledge for a brave new world of ideal families.

In order to realize the vision, the College aims to impart an education par excellence for the all-round development of the young women who enter its portals. They are trained to express themselves in love, compassion, creative action and self - discipline.

1.3 The Mission

1.4 The Coat of Arms

The College Coat of Arms highlights the intellectual and moral tasks envisaged by the founders. The motto on the crest is "Light, Life, Love": Light - for the enlightenment and illumination of heart and mind which enables one to dispel the darkness of ignorance and evil; Life - for the fullness of growth in every way, physical, intellectual, mental, emotional and spiritual; Love - for the law of compassion and tenderness which aims at a sweet fellowship among all, the cooperation and communion with one another and with the Supreme. The matrix of the shield encloses a central area divided into three parts. The upper triangular portion contains a heart with flames, symbolising the internal divine love. The lower triangle is split into two halves, one half endowed with the image of a book and the other, a wheel. The open book embodies pursuit of knowledge and the wheel indicates the flux and progress of life. The picture of the lilies on the shield, over the central area, evokes memories of St. Joseph, the holy patron of the college.

2. Those who are applying in Community Quota should select community quota option from seat reservation in Online application form. There is no separate application form for community quota.

3. Sports quota form can be downloaded from college website. Applicants have to submit print out of the application form along with SSLC, HSS, Degree Mark list and other relevant documents to head of the department of physical education on or before closing date of online submission of the application form.

4. If the payment is done through branch, attach the Pre-Acknowledgement Form with the print out of the application at the time of entrance examination.

GENERAL CONDITIONS

1. The eligibility conditions to apply for various programmes and the method of calculating index marks will be at par with the norms of University of Calicut.

2. The rank of the students who obtain the same index marks shall be, decided first on the basis of the marks obtained in the subject concerned, then by the marks secured for English followed by the age and then by name in alphabetical order unless otherwise specified.

3. While indexing marks for B.Com admission in the case of VHSE students, marks secured in practical papers of Commerce, VHSE Management studies and Humanities shall be excluded. Only the marks secured in written theory papers excluding the subject offered in lieu of second language shall be considered for indexing purpose.

4. In the case of VHSE students for admission to B.A. Language and Literature degree programme, the index marks shall be arrived at excluding the marks of the vocational subjects of VHSE.

5. In the case of courses equivalent to Plus two of Kerala HSE and have maximum marks or grades not in line with that of Plus Two of Kerala HSE, the same will be normalized to the maximum marks of Plus Two of Kerala HSE and the rank list will be prepared.

BONUS / WEIGHTAGE MARKS

1. A weightage of 15 marks added to the total shall be given in the case of ex-serviceman, widows and children of Jawan and ex-serviceman, and to the widows and children of B.S.F personnel killed or disabled in action.

2. A weightage of 15 marks shall be awarded as bonus marks to NSS/NCC cadets subject to the fulfilment of the following conditions for the purpose of ranking.

a. In respect of NCC applicant the bonus marks will be awarded on the basis of NCC certificates signed by the Director, issued by the Directorate of NCC to the candidates who have secured at least 75% of attendance after having participated in its activities during the course of study immediately preceding the course for which admission is sought

b. The basis for awarding bonus marks to the NSS volunteers will be the certificate signed by the director, issued by the Directorate of NSS

c. The benefit of bonus marks for the purpose of admission can be availed by the candidates only under any one category, either NSS or NCC

d. Cadets holding A, B, C certificates are eligible for an additional weightage of 3,5,10 marks respectively for the admission to Degree courses; limited to a maximum of 10 marks.

e. Additional weightage marks will be given only in case of those NCC certificate on the basis of which no grace marks have already been awarded.

3. A bonus/ weightage of (10 marks) will be given to those who got First place/A grade in Kerala State Higher Secondary/ Vocational Higher Secondary Arts festivals. (Not for CBSE)

4. Ten(10) Marks shall be deducted for every successive attempt after the first attempt, out of the raking points to those who have taken two or more chances to complete the qualifying examination, subject to a maximum of 25 marks. The number of chances means the number of chances taken for passing any part or parts of the qualifying examination. Betterment of examination will not be considered as a chance.

Please note :-

2.6 Higher Focus Course



RESEARCH CENTRES

Golden Jubilee Research Block

The Four Research Centres of the college are housed in the newly built Golden Jubilee Research block, spread over around 20,000 sq.ft on three floors, constructed at a cost of three crores. Centralised AC system , lift, seminar halls, conference hall, cabins for research guides and research scholars with computers and wi-fi facility are made available.

a) Centre for Research in Mathematical Sciences

The Centre for Research in Mathematical Sciences. affiliated to the University of Calicut is a recognized centre since December 2002 and involves in Higher learning and Research in the disciplines of Mathematics, Statistics and Computer Science. The Centre has four Research Supervisors Dr.Seena V.(Assistant Professor, of Mathematics, Christ Department College Irinjalakuda(2019)and Dr. Fijy Jose P (2019)and Dr. Sabna K.S.(2020) (Assistant Professor, Department of Mathematics, KKTM Govt. College Pullut, Kodungallur, Dr. Pravas K (2020)(Assistant Professor, Department of Mathematics, KKTM Govt. College Pullut, Kodungallur. Nine Research Scholars have been awarded Ph.D till date from this centre. Presently Seven Ph.D scholars are pursuing studies at the Centre. The centre organizes seminars/workshops/conferences of regional, National/ International level and focuses on training the students to inculcate research aptitude by providing project problems and platforms that educate them to adopt research oriented learning techniques.

b) Centre for Research in Chemical Sciences

This Centre has Six guides working on the frontier areas of Chemical Sciences. They are Dr. Pearly Sebastian, Dr.Deena Antony, Dr.Bincy Varghese, Dr. Bibitha Joseph, Dr.Manoj A L & Dr. Sinto Jacob (Department of Chemistry, St. Aloysius College, Elthuruthu. Six scholar is undergoing research at the centre. This centre is also famous for Gemological investgation. Some sophisticated instruments were purchased and renovation of the laboratory was also done availing the fund from the Department of Science and Technology, Government of India. The Chemistry Department maintains a broad selection of state-of-the art- research instrumentation facilities.

c) Centre for Research in Commerce and Management Studies

The centre got approval from the University in 2012 and has taken off with flying colours. The Centre has Five Research Supervisors. They are Dr. Philo Francis, Dr. Sr. Rosa K. D., Dr. Jancy Davy,Dr.Josheena Jose K, Assistant Professor,Christ College,IJK and Dr. Sandhya G Nair, Assistant Professor, Sri Vivekananda College, TSR. Eleven scholars have been awarded Ph.D. and 10 scholars are pursuing research studies at the centre. The centre has a commendable research oriented collection in its book shelves and journals archives. The centre conducts seminars and workshops on a regular basis to cater to the needs of the ever-changing global business environment.

d) Centre for Research in English

The Department of English was elevated to the research department status in the year 2012. The Centre for Research in English Language and Literature became fully functional in 2015 with Dr. Asha Thomas becoming a recognized research guide. The centre offers guidance in various areas such as cultural studies, children's literature, theory, fiction and poetry studies. Currently there are 5 research scholars registered, 2 as full timers and 3 as part timers, with their work proceeding steadily at various stages.

e) CDRĽ (Communicable Disease Research Laboratory)

Communicable Disease Research Laboratory, an extension of Zoology department, is a Golden Jubilee initiative of St. Joseph's College Irinjalakuda. Hale and hearty territory is the vision of the lab and is actively engaged in research activities emphasizing eradication and control of communicable diseases. Currently the lab has two Major Research Projects funded by DST & DBT.

There are five full time research scholars under the supervision of the research guide, Dr. Aneesh E.M. Within a short span of time, the lab could publish fifty research papers in peer reviewed International Research Journal.

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6. COLLEGE RULES & REGULATIONS

Self discipline is the best means for the development of an individual. However, for the effective management of any institution, rules and regulations that can enforce discipline become necessary. Every student of St. Joseph's is expected to observe all these rules and regulations of the college. The decision of the Principal will be final in all matters pertaining to the enforcement of the rules and regulations. 6.1 Imperatives

 \Rightarrow A working day begins in the college with the morning prayer. The entire college is supposed to participate in the assembly with due respect and devotion.

 \Rightarrow A call to auditorium for Morning Prayer or for a common purpose or for a program must be promptly complied without fail. No one shall remain in class rooms or elsewhere during such occasions.

 \Rightarrow Students are to remain in their classrooms during the entire time of the class periods.

 \Rightarrow Students are not expected to leave the campus during the working hours. In case of an emergency, sanction must be obtained from the Principal on a written request duly countersigned by the Parent/Guardian/Warden and the class teacher.

⇒ Cleanliness in classrooms, verandahs, and premises is essential. Avoid leaning against walls and door-ways, writing on desks, benches and walls and fixing nails, pasting bills, notices etc. on the walls.

⇒ No bills posters or notices should be put up on the walls on the campus without the permission of the Principal even during the election time.

 \Rightarrow All sorts of Information meant for the students will be displayed on the notice boards as and when necessary. Students should consult all the notice boards every day unfailingly.

 \Rightarrow Complaints of students will be looked into if they are presented through the proper channel. Make use of the services of the Grievance Redress Cell as far as possible.

⇒ Letters officially addressed to the Principal should accompany self addressed sufficiently stamped envelope, if reply is expected.

 \Rightarrow Two-wheelers should be parked only in the parking area meant for them.

 \Rightarrow There are places and times of silence on the campus.

Strict silence must be observed in the chapel and library and after the bell for classes. Chapel and its premises can be used only for prayer. Strict discipline and decorum is expected of the students during programs convened in the auditorium or elsewhere.

Students are requested to see that an attitude of respect, love and consideration is reflected in their behavior towards elders, teachers, peers and others.

University Rules

⇒ Interference of the Student Organizations adversely affecting the peaceful conduct of curricular activities within the campus is prohibited.

Students should not resort to Gheraos, Bandh, Hartal and any sort of violence within the campus. Students should not resort to Strike/Dharna without giving one day's notice to the Principal / Head of the Institution.

Students' Grievance Redress Cell shall be constituted in every college with the following members.

- ⇒ Principal as Chairman
- ➡ Three teachers nominated by the College Council of whom one shall be a lady
- ➡ College Union Chairman & Secretary and one student nominated by the College Council
- An appeal lies with the University that the Students' Grievance Redress Cell, shall be constituted as follows:

Vice-Chancellor-Chairman

Dean of Students' Welfare-Secretary

Student Syndicate Member

Two other Syndicate Members nominated by the Syndicate

University Union Chairman & Secretary

⇒ Students should desist from disfiguring the classrooms, compound walls and buildings in the college campus by pasting posters or writing on the walls as part of their election campaign. They should also desist from disfiguring the compound walls of neighboring buildings as well. Election campaign/propaganda on the college campus should be limited to pamphlets and bit-notices.

 \Rightarrow Students can convene meeting only with the prior permission of the Principal. Persons who are not on the rolls

of the College register should not be allowed to take part in the propaganda work in the college campus. Students should not arrange for election propaganda/campaign meeting in the college campus except with the specific sanction of the Principal.

6.2 Uniform

The official uniform of the college has to be **purchased from the college store** and students should wear this on the following occasions:-

a) The first working day of every month

b) Re-opening days after Onam and X-mas holidays

c) Special days with previous notice.

On all other working days, students are expected to wear simple and plain clothes such as Churidar with Shawl and Saree or skirt with blouse. Border or embroidery work or self print or other decorative designs must be strictly avoided. Dothi, Mini skirt, Midi, Jeans, Pants etc.. are not allowed.

A fine of Rs. 100/- will be imposed on those students who come in non-uniform.

6.3 Attendance and Leave

a. The college working time is from 9.30 am. to 3.30 p.m. during which an hour at the close is set apart for various career development programmes for the students. The rest is divided into 5 periods with a lunch - break from 12.10 p.m. to 12.55 p.m. The first bell goes at 9.25 a.m. for the morning assembly after which strict silence is to be maintained.

b. There shall be a minimum of 90 working days in the Semester.

c. Teachers are responsible for marking the attendance of students at the commencement of each period.

d. Every student is expected to attend class promptly and regularly. Any student who has incurred excessive absence, even for serious reasons, may be withdrawn from the course of study.

e. According to University norms, attendance is considered for awarding internal marks.

75 % of the prescribed attendance is required for the issue of attendance and progress certificate.

If a Student's attendance falls short of the minimum attendance required, She will have to apply for exemption through the Principal to the University. The deficiency will be condoned only where the syndicate is satisfied that the absence was for reasons beyond the control of the student. Reasons for leave will have to be forwarded along with a Medical Certificate if required. The application for exemption shall be accompained by a chalan receipt for the required amount.

f. Request for leave must be for an acceptable reason and is to be made in the prescribed form which may be obtained from the college office. Leave applications of day scholars and hostellers must be countersigned by the parent/ guardian/warden and the concerned class teachers.

g. If a student is absent for a week or more without forwarding the leave application, her name will be removed from the rolls. A fine will be collected for each day without leave. In case she is not able to submit the leave application ahead of time, she is expected to do it at the earliest. Students are not allowed to enter the class before submitting the leave application.

h. Students who absent themselves without leave on the re-opening days will be fined Rs. 100/-

i. Regular attendance is insisted upon in Religion and Ethics classes.

j. Leave from class for one period for valid reasons may be granted by the teacher in - charge of the concerned period. If a student wants to leave the college early, she must get permission directly from the principal against a written request countersigned by parent/guardian/ warden and class - teacher.

Strict action will be taken against students who leave classes or the college without prior permission. 6.4 Examinations

a) All the examinations conducted by the Department or college are obligatory.

b) Internals and Terminal examinations are regularly scheduled. Absence from an examination without the prior permission of the principal will incur a fine fixed by the Principal. In case of illness, the leave application must be submitted beforehand. The medical certificate is to be produced without delay.

c) If a student is absent from an examination, the teacher/ department concerned may assign a supplementary examination for the concerned student. The date, duration, venue and other details are left to the discretion of the teacher or department concerned. d) Any malpractice at the general or class examinations will [¬] be dealt with seriously.

e) There will be examinations in Christian doctrine for Catholic students and in moral science for Non - Catholic students. Participation is compulsory.

f) Progress reports are issued by the college office after the completion of each terminal examination. These reports on the students' performance are information to the parents on the academic standing and progress of their daughters. Therefore the cards are to be examined carefully by the parents/guardians and signed in front of the class teacher on the prescribed day.

6.5 Issue of Certificates

a. No transfer certificate will be issued if there is an amount due to the college.

b. Transfer certificates must be claimed by the students within one month after the withdrawal or the publication of the respective University examination results.

c. A student applying for certificates of Transfer, Character, Age, Marks etc., shall do so to the principal stating the year, class number, and the class last attended. Fees will be charged for every such certificate.

d. A notice of twenty four hours is necessary for the issue of the certificates.

e. The conduct certificate is a document of credit of one's meritorious behaviour. There should be a healthy competitive spirit among students to excel in their general conduct and character. Then it will be a matter of pride and pleasure to issue the certificate of conduct to the students.

f. The S.S.L.C./ and Plus Two Certificates will be returned to the respective students only on completion of the course of study or on leaving the college in the middle of the year with the T.C. issued. In case a student needs her S.S.L.C. / +two Book for producing elsewhere, she is requested to apply for it to the principal remitting a search fee of Rs.10/-

g. It is advisable for the students to keep sufficient number of attested copies of their mark lists and other documents before the originals are submitted for any purpose.

6.6 Fee Regulations

1. Fees once paid is not refundable.

2. No part payment of fees will be accepted. Students should pay the exact amount due at the office, and receipts will be issued for all payments. Such receipts may be called for later verification, if necessary.

3. Students leaving the College after the commencement of a term will have to pay the whole Term Fees.

4. Students joining the College in between the course will have to pay the fees for the whole year.

5. Fees will be accepted in the office only on the due dates fixed.

6. Absence with leave or without leave from the College is no excuse for non-payment of fees at the proper time.

7. If any student fails to pay the fees or special fees on the due date, she shall be liable to pay a fine of Rs. 5/- along with the fees or special fees on or before the 10th day after the due ate. If the 10th day happens to be a holiday, the next working day will be counted as the 10th day.

8. It is the responsibility of each student to know the amount due.

9. Students who fail to comply with the financial regulations as specified, may be suspended from classes. No report or recomme ndation is issued until the due amount is paid out.

10. Caution money will be refunded at the end of the course after deducting the establishment dues, breakages & all other dues.

As per Government rules, SC, ST and OEC students of aided programs are eligible for fee concessions and stipend as the case may be. Scholarships, free-ships and bursaries are available for deserving students irrespective of caste or community.

7.2 Educational Concessions

a. SC, ST and OEC Students are eligible for fee concession and stipend. Necessary certificates of income, nativity and community from Tahsildar, S.S.L.C.mark lists, Plus Two mark lists, Aadhar no & A/c no must be produced at the time of admission.

b. O.B.C. Students and Students of Forward Communities are eligible for fee - concessions if the annual income of their family is below Rs. 25000/- for undergraduate and Rs. 39000/- for post graduate students. For this, income certificate, parent's salary/pension certificate must be produced at the time of admission.

c. Fee-concession is available to:

(i) Children of Political prisoners

(ii) Children of I.N.A. personnel

(iii) Dependants of Military service personnel who have been killed or disabled in action.

(iv) Students with more than 45% marks are eligible for Unified fee- concession based on the income limit

(v) Financial aid is given to deserving students from Students Aid Fund, College Silver jubilee Fund and Rev. Sr. Mary Franco Charitable Trust for which they have to apply and produce income certificates.

7.3 Scholarships

Quite a few scholarships are available to students from various sources. It is the obligation of students to familiarise themselves with the conditions stipulated to secure the scholarships. The following facts are meant only as guide lines.

8. THE COLLEGE ACTIVITIES

8.1 College Union

The largest student body responsible for student support activities, the College Union functions in this campus as a democratically elected statutory body with powers and privileges as laid down in the university statutes. The students can expect the best and the most reliable support

from the college union in all their needs and requirements and this keeps the campus atmosphere and ambience warm and welcoming. Election to the positions of the College Union is done adhering strictly to the university statute norms and it is perhaps an educating experience offered to the students to rule themselves keeping the welfare and well being of their fellow students foremost in mind.

In the functioning of the College Union, the office bearers are advised and aided by the Staff Advisor, a member of the teaching staff appointed by the Principal and ratified by the College Union. The functioning of the Arts Club also is under the guidance of a teaching staff member designated as President who is also appointed by the Principal in consultation with the College Union. However, the Principal is the ultimate head of all the programs and events organized and hosted by the college union on the campus. The President of the Union is the Principal (ex-officio).

8.3 Associations & Activities

8.3.1 AICUF

A unit of the AICUF, an organization that tries to link the students to the emerging needs and realities of the university, the church and the wider society, is fully functional in the campus in order to foster formation and personal holiness of catholic students and to enable them to participate in the work of the lay apostolate. The unit organizes programs of catholic action to develop and strengthen Christian ideals and leadership. One of the urgent needs of the modern world is to have ideal, learned scholars and leaders who can face the situation squarely and introduce modes of living better suited for the present day generation. AICUF caters to this urgent need.

8.3.2 National Service Scheme (NSS)

Two units of the National Service Scheme are functioning on our campus under two Faculty Program Officers acquainting the students with voluntary social service through participatory manual work, the teachers themselves giving the lead and guidance. With "Not Me, But You", as its motto, NSS expresses the essence of democratic living and upholds the need for selfless service and appreciation of another man's point of view and also promotes consideration for fellow human beings.

The programs of the units on our campus mainly concern personality development through social service or community service, especially in villages, where the real India lives. Camps are conducted annually in rural locations for this purpose. The camps may typically last for a week or ten days. Many short term camps are also conducted. The major projects undertaken by our units are adoption of Village, cleaning of public places, construction and repair of roads and water sources, afforestation, literacy classes, watershed projects, plastic eradication, health camps, home for the homeless, debates, seminars, campaigns against social evils etc. The N.S.S. units of the college have successfully impressed the outside world with their dedicated and sincere efforts.

8.3.3 National Cadet Corps (NCC)

NCC, the national organization engaged in grooming the youth of the country into disciplined and patriotic citizens, has one of its all women army units on our campus too and it functions under an Auxiliary NCC officer of the rank of a Lieutenant. The functioning of the unit on this campus has always given sufficient cause for pride for the institution for it has won many national and international honours, awards and recognitions. The organization also seeks to develop character, comradeship, discipline, leadership, secular outlook, spirit of adventure, and ideals of selfless service amongst the youth.

The contribution of NCC to create a human resource of organized, trained and motivated youth is also immense. The cadets are also trained to provide leadership in all walks of life and be always available for the service of the nation. We also train them for various NCC examinations like 'B' and 'C' certificate so that they can take up careers in armed forces.

8.3.4 English for Empowerment Club

Orientation classes are given to all students. Periodical meetings, debates, discussions and English film shows are held. Efforts are taken to develop the communicative skills of club members.

8.3.5 Fine Arts Club

The Campus Arts Centre is the college fine arts club. The function of the club is to promote the artistic talents in the students and a secretary elected by the entire college co-ordinates its functions under the guidance of a teaching staff member designated as its President.

This centre is an organ of the college union and its functions culminate in the College Arts Festival held every year with the objective of selecting artists to represent the college in various arts festivals from among the students. The various clubs operating on the campus offer the students with various interests and tastes a number of platforms to develop their intrinsic talent.

8.3.6 Eco Club & Nature Club

The Clubs function with the aim of creating awareness among the students about the problems related to the environment and nature.

The members of the club take part in various seminars and other competitions conducted by various organizations related to this field. A manuscript called 'Haritha' is also brought out every year reflecting the realities of nature through articles and paintings. Environment concern and conservation is an issue that has to engage the immediate attention of the youth because it is one of the areas in which we sadly lag behind.

A lot remains to be done in this area in India and therefore a youth force well aware of the seriousness of the matter is highly necessary.

8.3.7 Biodiversity Club

Biodiversity club of St. Joseph's College is a part of Kerala State Biodiversity Board Programme. 20 cents plot was alloted for conserving and protecting endangered and rare plants names as "SANTHISTAL". St. Joseph's college is the first college in the Thrissur district to take initiative and participate in the Kerala State Biodiversity Programme. The activity of the club is interdisciplinary in nature and the area of plot is reared with rare and endangered varieties of mango, native varieties of jackfruit and gooseberry plants.

8.3.8 Anti-Narcotics Club (ANC)

On 25th June 2014, in collaboration with the Excise Department the College formed an Anti-Narcotics Club

to prevent substance abuse. Each participating student who is enrolled would carry forward the message that substance abuse is a disease, an addiction that should be prevented. Students should be aware of peer pressure and face challenges and not take to drugs.

8.3.9 Sports & Games

The college is keen on encouraging students to discover and enhance their skill and talents in the field of sports & Games. Apart from being the unbeaten champions of volleyball in the Calicut University for several years in succession, the college has outstanding achievements in Basket Ball, Ball & Shuttle Badminton, Soft ball & Chess. Various sports and Games Competitions are held class wise in connection with the college annual day. Students also participate in a number of tournaments and coaching camps organized by the university, within the state and outside the state. Many of our students who excel in sports and games have won scholarships and jobs in various fields.

8.3.10 Walk With a Scholar programme (W.W.S.)

Walk With a Scholar Programme is a novel and flagship initiative of the Department of Collegiate Education started at St. Josephs College Irinjalakuda, in 2014-15. Having recognised the fact that the best preparation for making a living comes through learning the art of reading carefully, writing clearly and persuasively, reasoning quantitatively and analytically, evaluating evidence effectively, and thinking critically, the programme introduces the idea of *mentoring*. Mentoring is a personal enhancement strategy through which one person facilitates the development of another by sharing known resources, expertise, values, skills, perspectives, attitudes and proficiencies. It allows the learner to build skills and knowledge while attaining goals for career development.

The programme is envisaged to provide necessary orientation, guidance and motivation to the promising students so as to enrich and nourish their talents for higher studies and better employment. Its target is to develop certain generic skills, non-technical competencies, attitudes and behaviours that contribute to a person's sense of self and personal well-being.

8.3.11 Scholar Support Programme(SSP)

As a part of New Initiatives by the Department of Collegiate Education, St. Josephs College Irinjalakuda has started Scholar Support Programme from the academic year 2014-2015. The candidates are selected from the first semester of the Under Graduate Programme. The programme offers personalised additional instructional sessions of 60 hours each in Semesters 1 & 2 to support 50 academically backward students. Six teachers specialised in six areas of knowledge and a coordinator is involved in the successful implementation of the programme. The extra coaching has proved to be highly beneficial to the weaker students who aspire to be successful in life.

8.3.12 ASAP

ASAP (Additional Skill Acquisition Programme) is a skill development project of the government of kerala aimed to equip the young population with skills in cutting edge sectors, in order to alleviate the unemployment problem in the state. The college has been partnering with the government in this ambitious project for the last couple of years, ever since the launch of the project. ASAP will provide additional skill sets to students along with their regular courses. The project envisages creation of a large talent pool where the learners will be imparted communication skills in English, Basic IT and an Elective Domain Specific Skill Course.

8.3.13 Literary Club

The Literary Association enables the students to develop their literary and oratorical skills. It gives them a platform to find the acadamic challenge, enrich their vocabulary, build their communication skills as well as confidence.

8.3.14 Oratory & Quiz club

Oratory club is to develop public speaking skills, confidence and the unique talents of the participating youth. The club organizes competitions and debates focusing on the improvement of communicative ability. The club provides opportunities for developing Public Speaking Abilities, Communication Skills and Personality Development. The quiz club aims at identifying students who are talented in quiz and also creating opportunities for them to sharpen their quizzing skills. Quiz competitions are conducted in the campus to improve the general knowledge of the students. The students are also given opportunities to represent the college in quiz competitions conducted by other institutions.

8.3.15 Departmental Associations

A variety of programmes and activities such as seminars, symposia, workshops, manuscript magazines, exhibitions, socially relevant projects, cultural programmes etc. are organized by the various departmental associations.

8.3.16 GRACE

The college has a fully functional research promotion centre called GRACE (Guidance for Research and Assistance for Consultancy and Extension) operating since 2004, augmenting' the promotion and development of research activities and research excellence of the College.

8.3.17 IQAC

IQAC is the NAAC – stipulated Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the college which strives for excellence through Consistent Quality Sustenance And Enhancement. The cell formulates and implements a programmed action that ensures quality performance, internalizes and institutionalizes innovative and best practices, facilitates timely ICT upgradation, coordinates teaching, research, extension and consultancy activities, spearheads the feedback mechanism and assimilates and documents programmes and activities organized.

8.5 Display Board

Each department is allotted a notice board where they display important activities organized by the department. Also exhibited are cut outs and details of relevant subjects of academic and non academic importance. Every year prizes are awarded to outstanding Display Boards.

9. RESOURCES AND SERVICES

9.1 Library

Web-enabled and bar coded library has a total of about 65,899 books, 250 periodicals & journals and 1200 CDs & 20 Cassettes. It is a veritable storehouse of knowledge and one of the finest in the University. The Librarian and Library Assistants maintain a brisk and efficient working system and help provide an atmosphere highly suited for scholastic pursuits. A wing of the Library has been set apart for the Post Graduate Students . The library provides facilities such as Printing, Scanning, Reprogrphy and Digital Library.

Internet Kiosk & INFLIBNET

Free internet facility is offered to the students and teachers in the library. The internet kiosk attached to the library has terminals open for use during library hours. Online public access system is in operation in the library. The electronic resource management package used is N-List of INFLIBNET. In-house/remote access to publications is through personal ID provided by N-List. **Library Membership and ILS**

All the members of the faculty, staff and students of the college are eligible for library membership. College identity cards will be issued to the students after the commencement of each course, following the orientation programme on the use of the library and e-library.

Library Counter

The attendent at the counter is deputed to ensure the following:-

- 1. No outsider enters the library without the prior permission of the principal or the librarian.
- 2. No personal belongings except a note book or paper and pen are to be taken to the library.
- 3. College Identity Card should be produced at the check in-check out system.
- 4. No book or periodical goes out without entry in the library record.

Library Ethics and Rules

Working Hours 8.30am - 5.00pm. on all working days. Issue of Books

- **1)** Students can select books of their choice from the OPAC. Using issue slips and identity cards, books are issued on loan at the counter.
- Loan period for UG students Study Books : 5 books for 14 days Loan period for PG students Study Books : 7 books for 14 days Overnight issues are available on special occasion.

3) Over- due charges:-

Over-due charges are to be paid regularly. Any student found guilty of tearing or spoiling the pages of books or periodicals will lose her privileges of using the library.

4) Loss of books :-

Loss of books should be reported immediately to the librarian so that over-due charges do not accumulate. The lost book is to be replaced by a new one approved by the Librarian within a period of 14 days.

5) Damaging or Spoiling of Books:-

Damaging or spoiling of books or periodicals by underlining words, defacing books, cutting pages etc. will be charged as in the case of lost books. If a book is found spoilt or damaged, the last person who borrowed the book will be held responsible. So if the student finds the books defective, it should be reported to the issuing staff and their signature obtained. Registered open-access system is being followed. The students may go to the shelves to get the books of their choice. Reading and reference work can be done throughout the working hours.

9.2 Hostel

The college has special provision in the form of full-fledged hostel rooms to accommodate about 350 students belonging to the far flung suburbs of the Irinjalakuda town seeking admission for its programs.Residence facilities are available in the campus. The "Holy Family Hostel" that provides the safe, secure and comfortable residence facilities to them is a virtual ' home away from home' for them. Those who would like to stay in the hostel should apply in the prescribed form at the time of admission. Administered by the Sisters of Holy Family Congregation, the hostel is located at an arm's length from the campus. Admission and Fee regulations will be as per the stipulated hostel rules. The College is also equipped with Sports Hostels for Volleyball and Basket Ball.

9.3 Canteen

The renovated Cafeteria provides hygienic local delicacies at reasonable rates for nonresidential students and faculty. 9.4 Parents, Teachers and Well Wishers Association (P.T.W.A) Ever since its inception, the college has had the unflagging support and aid of the Parent Teachers and Well-wishers' Association for all its plans, policies and programs. The Association is the general body of the parents of the existing students, members of the faculty and a number of wellwishers who have stood with the college in all its days through thick and thin. The general body of the association meets once or twice a year and for all immediate requirements once or twice a year the Executive committee is convened and decisions taken. 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10. EXTENSION SERVICES

10.1. Sr. Mary Franco Memorial Educational & Charitable Trust

The Trust is instituted in memory of the Founder Principal, Rev. Sr. Mary Franco in 2012 in commemoration of her first death anniversary. The objectives of the Trust include empowerment of women through education & training, provision of medical & healthcare, assistance to deserving students & parents in academic and extracurricular activities, honoring outstanding alumnae etc. The beneficiaries include students from outside institutions and the public.

10.2.CASP (Community Aided Sponsorship Program)

The social service project CASP has been functioning in the campus for years. Twenty-five poor school children of the BPL (Below Poverty Line) group of the locality have been adopted to be taken care of. The CASP takes complete responsibility of educational, physical, emotional, spiritual and other developmental needs of the children under its care.

They are offered tuition facilities if they are under achievers and are counseled at the right stage to avoid getting misguided by anti-social elements. Their parents also are offered opportunity to get involved in some of their activities so that they are convinced of the good intentions and designs of the Program. The children are taught to live in complete harmony with the society composed of members of various

religious and cultural groups so that they are not carried away by the tempting rewards offered to them by anti-socials. The functioning of the CASP has been going on for the last several years and the program is today hailed as one of the most effective non-governmental support initiatives that takes utmost care of the needy and the deserving.

10.3 The Career Guidance Cell

The Centre functions mainly for (1) identifying opportunities for the pass-outs of all programs (2) offering them suitable on-campus training to enhance student employability for the openings identified and (3) counseling for career destination and higher education progression. The Career Centre provides impartial information, advice, support and guidance for under-graduates, post graduates, researchers, staff, and employees covering everything from further study to professional training. Career service also provides career assessment, drop-in advising, workshops, job- database for internships and career employment, career fairs, on-campus interviews, reference letter service and monthly career planning sessions by external experts from the segments of commerce and industry, government and public sector departments and defense services. Careerrelated work experience can be gained through the Internship Certificate Program offered for select courses by the Career Services. Training workshops and one-to-one guidance also form part of the career assurance initiatives of the Centre. The Centre considers information empowerment as one of its prime functions and provides career information, advice and guidance to all students and graduates to aid and accelerate their transition into employment and further study.

We also provide services to external organizations, employers and wider community in making available to them adhoc personnel for work of brief tenure nature. 10.5 Darsana Counselling Centre

Darsana, the on-campus professional Counselling centre of the college provides solace and succor to the students and the public who suffer from the stress and strain of life experiences. The timely help rendered by two full-time counselors available at the centre has succeeded in bringing many students and families back to joyful life from the brink of break down. The centre has floated several programs such as school and institutional counseling, hospital counseling, awareness programs like marriage preparation courses, extension classes etc. But its flagship program is the deaddiction centre attached to it. It works in close association with the AA (Alcoholic Anonymous).

10.6. Vocational Centre

The Social Work Centre of the college is a Vocational Centre

which offers training to those who are interested in various skills such as Book Binding, Tailoring and Embriodery, Typewriting, Chalk Making, Flower Making, Frame Printing, Making Handicraft items and Toys, Making Notebooks and candles, selling them at subsidized rates. The Centre is provided with facilities for Photostat and Printing, and also conducts awareness programmes for girls.

10.7. Connecting through Computer Centre

The Computing resource bay addresses an array of general student support services like computing, word-processing, reprography, printing, communication etc. In addition, the centre offers short-term sessions beyond college hours in general computer instruction or programming languages associated with Information Technology to update computing skills or reinforce existing ones. Regardless of their optional, students can visit the Computing Center for assistance in computing-related questions or course work. Students are always encouraged to join computer progression courses at the time of admission, so that they can qualify themselves in computer education, along with the completion of the degree course. It assists students also with writing projects that include class writing assignments, personal statements, resumes and cover letters, and creative writing. A full time qualified consultant is available for students seeking help at any point in the writing process: brainstorming, developing a thesis, organizing, revising, using sources, and editing.

10.8. Fitness Centre

As part of the fitness drive and to facilitate toning of the whole body a multi- stationed fitness centre with motorized Tread mill, Orbitruk, Vibrators, Wrist Curl, Bicycle aerometer, Twister, Stepper, Cross over machine, Peck deck machine, High lat pulley/Rowing pulley, Inclined abdomen bench, Inclined leg press heavy machine, Leg curl & leg extension machine, Inclined bench press, Vital (standing abdomen), Horizontal bar for gymnastics, facilities for free weight exercises etc. has been attached to the physical education department.

10.9. Health Centre

The mission of the Campus Health Center is to promote

health care, enrich the student health experience and support providing high quality, accessible, immediate and essential medical care to students, with a focus on health education and illness prevention. It also takes care to inculcate healthy practices and thereby to create a healthy campus community.

The Centre provides weekly services of two doctors on call and holds health clinics, health awareness Programs, nutritional information, vaccination drives etc free of cost to the students.

10.10. Yoga Centre

Control of all mental function and silencing the mind are the keys to success. To tone one's mind and to regain the peace and harmony of life, a yoga centre has been attached to the indoor stadium. Centre has been conducting regular yoga classes and a certificate course in yoga education (C.Y.Ed.). 40 yoga foldable floor spreads are arranged in the centre for the yoga practitioners. Activities of the centre have been stretched to yoga classes, yoga seminars, yoga teachers training, yoga courses, yoga competitions and yoga publications.

10.11. Medicinal Garden

About 100 medicinal plants are grown in the fenced medicinal garden within the College Campus, managed by the Dept. of Botany.

10.12. Telephone Booth

Among the various amenities provided for the essential convenience of the students, the Telecom-Point has an important place. This is a campus where Cell-phones are legally forbidden and as such the means by which the students can communicate with their families, relatives or friends in case of urgent need is provided by the college. This facility is also important for the reason that this is a free gift of the alumnae association to their successors in the campus.



St. Mariam Thresia was born in the Chiramel Mankidivan family in Puthenchira, Kerala, on 26th April 1876. Her whole life was a beautiful and powerful utterance of her passion for the Lord and compassion for His people. She was convinced that the world could be saved only through families embedded on the rock of love, and founded the Congregation dedicated to the cause of families on 14 May 1914. Knowing that education of women was crucial for their empowerment and the formation of ideal families, she dared to blaze a trail and started a primary school in 1915;the roots of St. Joseph's College lie deep in this vision of St. Mariam Thressia. On 8th June 1926, she left for her heavenly abode and was declared 'Blessed' on 9th April 2000. The Canonization of the Blessed Mother was held on 13th October 2019.

Venerable Fr. Joseph Vithayathil, the co-founder of the Congregation of Holy Family was born on 23rd July 1865 in the parish of Manambady, Puthenpally. He received the priestly ordination on 11th March 1894. When the Congregation of the Holy Family was erected, the father was appointed its invaluable wisdom chaplain. His guided the destiny of the Congregation and his spiritual foresight and cautious courage directed St. Mariam Thressia in the struggles of her soul. Father Vithayathil was called to his heavenly on 8th June 1964. He was abode declared 'Servant of God' and raised to the honours of the altar in June 2004. In December 2015 the sainty priest was pronounced 'Venerable' by the Catholic Church.
